During his tenure at this position, he earned a Master of Education in Educational Administration and Supervision Degree from Arizona State University, and the PUHSD Native American Education Program became a best practices program for the Arizona Department of Education in the areas of student retention, academic excellence and graduation.

Their college-bridge program, The Hoop of Learning Program, received the Phoenix Mayor's Partnership Award for several years, and it is still active in many of the school districts in Phoenix and the Maricopa Community College District. Mr. Hibbeler and his family moved back to Nebraska to be closer to home, and he is currently the Tribal Extension Educator for the Extension Division at UNL.

The Commission on Indian Affairs was established in 1971 and consists of 14 Indian commissioners appointed by the Governor. The commission's statutory mission is "to do all things which it may determine to enhance the cause of Indian rights and to develop solutions to problems common to all Nebraskan Indians."

It is the state liaison between the four headquarter tribes of the Omaha, Ponca, Santee Sioux, and Winnebago Tribes of Nebraska. It helps ensure the sovereignty of both tribal and state governments are recognized and acted upon in a true government-to-government relationship. The commission serves off-reservation Indian communities by helping assure they are afforded the right to equitable opportunities in the areas of housing, employment, education, health care, economic development and human/civil rights within Nebraska. All goals of the commission are accomplished through advocacy, education, and promotion of legislation.

Joslyn Art Museum is the largest museum in the state of Nebraska and a cultural cornerstone of the city of Omaha for 90 years. Joslyn's collections comprise over 12,000 works of art and reflect over 3,000 years of human creativity. The Museum offers a wide range of programs for schools and

individuals of every age and ability, with a strong history of community partnerships. Joslyn's campus currently features its original 1931 building, the 1994 Walter and Suzanne Scott Pavilion, and sculpture gardens added in 2009. Now, the Museum is growing again. On May 2, 2022, Joslyn Art Museum temporarily closed to the public for a period of two years as it undergoes a major transformation. Construction is underway on a new 42,000-square-foot addition—the Rhonda and Howard Hawks Pavilion—and significant renovations are also happening. MID-AMERICA TRANSPORTATION CENTER

Since 2006 the Mid-America Transportation Center has been designated as the United States Department of Transportation Region 7 University Transportation Center. Region 7 is composed of Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, and Nebraska. WORLDS OF CONNECTIONS



Worlds of Connections is a University of Nebraska-Lincoln led Science Education Partnership Award (SEPA) that works to enhance the diversity of the biobehavioral and biomedical workforce by engaging youth from underrepresented groups through lessons, activities, and augmented reality/virtual reality media.

The program is funded by the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and is used to promote public understanding of the benefits of NIH-funded research for public health with a focus on network science. Network science is an emerging field that provides a key analytical lens for understanding health processes using advanced relational approaches to health data.

SPRING CREEK PRAIRIE AUDUBON CENTER



The mission of the National Audubon Society is to protect birds and the places they need, today and tomorrow. Spring Creek Prairie Audubon Center focuses on conservation of the tallgrass prairie ecosystem and the birds that rely on it.

Land Acknowledgement - The treatied and unceded land that Spring Creek Prairie Audubon Center currently manages for birds and operates its visitor center upon has a rich history of native peoples living with the land. We recognize that we are not the first land stewards of the tallgrass prairie in

southeastern Nebraska. As we continue this legacy of care for the prairie and all the wildlife, plants, water, and people who need it, we acknowledge the history, knowledge, and culture of those who have come before us on the land (Pawnee, Otoe, Kansa, Kiowa) and those that walk alongside us today (Ponca, Omaha, & Winnebago Tribes of Nebraska). As you enjoy this program or your visit to Spring Creek Prairie Audubon Center, please take a moment to acknowledge the people on whose sacred land you walk.

Audubon established Spring Creek Prairie Audubon Center in 1998 on the site of the former O'Brien ranch approximately 20 minutes southwest of Lincoln, Nebraska. This 850-acre tallgrass prairie sanctuary offers over three miles of walking trails, native prairie grasslands, wetlands and ponds, wildflowers and grasses, and beautiful scenic vistas. In its midst more than 235 species of birds, 370 species of plants, and other wildlife dwell side-by-side with historic 19th-century wagon ruts from a cutoff to the Oregon Trail.

Family nature programs, school field trips, special events, and burgeoning attendance resulted in the construction of our visitor center, which opened in 2006. Through educating the public about the value of tallgrass prairie while introducing thousands to its beauty and diversity, we are helping preserve this singular – and very threatened – portion of the plains.

RABBLE MILL

Rabble Mill is a 501c3 nonprofit with a mission to work with Nebraska youth statewide toward achieving the belonging, purpose, and upward mobility necessary to grow, achieve, and reinvest in their community.

Through out-of-school-time, youth engagement in Omaha, Lincoln, and statewide, we create opportunities for K-12 youth to fall in love with skateboarding, music and digital creation — teaching social-emotional and technical (including STEAM) skills along the way.

UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA STATE MUSEUM - MORRILL HALL



Established in 1871, the University of Nebraska State Museum is the state's premier museum of natural history. The mission of the Museum is to discover and disseminate knowledge about the natural world through research and education. The Museum is accredited by the American Alliance of Museums and is a proud Smithsonian Affiliate. Visitors to Morrill Hall will find interactive exhibits featuring Nebraska's past and present biological diversity, and its cultural heritage with a dedicated First Peoples of the Plains gallery.

Morrill Hall is known for its paleontological collections, especially its iconic Elephant Hall, where visitors will see the world's largest articulated fossil Columbian mammoth alongside a unique collection of Nebraskan fossil elephants. Also featured are interactive paleontology exhibits including a Jurassic dinosaur gallery. The recently renovated fourth floor includes a Smithsonian-inspired Visible Lab, hands-on Science Exploration Zone, and Sustainable Earth gallery with a 5-foot diameter digital globe. The onsite Mueller Planetarium provides visitors with additional opportunities to explore our Universe and our place in it. In addition to the permanent galleries, the museum hosts temporary exhibits on diverse topics.

As an active University-based research museum, faculty curators, students and staff maintain over 13 million specimens, ethnographic and archeological objects. Research collections include: anthropology, botany, entomology, geology, invertebrate paleontology, parasitology, vertebrate paleontology, and zoology.

UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA MEDICAL CENTER





The University of Nebraska Medical Center (UNMC) was founded in 1869 and chartered as the state's first medical college in 1881, and became part of the University of Nebraska in 1902. Now UNMC trains more health professionals than any other institution in the state.
