

Pilot Analysis of Mental Health Resource Use and Rural Officer Wellbeing in Nebraska

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Introduction


- Police officers have higher rates of burnout and a 54% higher suicide rate as compared to the general population (Violanti et al., 2021)
- Average police suicide rate is 18.10/100,000
 - Yet, the smallest departments (50 or fewer officers) have a suicide rate of 43.78/100,000 (Violanti et al, 2012)
- Rural is defined as any municipality with a population of 5,000 or fewer residents according to the 2020 survey (USDA, 2024)
- Rural agencies hire fewer officers, which translates to small sample sizes and difficulty generalizing findings and causes them to be overlooked in research on police mental health (Johnson & Rhodes, 2008)
- Existing research skews toward urban agencies and is likely unrepresentative of officers' experiences across the United States (Johnson & Rhodes, 2008)
 - Despite gaps in research, many police agencies in the U.S. are rural (Weisheit et al., 2006)
 - Officers with lower wellbeing, burnout, job dissatisfaction, and suicidality are unlikely to meet performance standards or stay in the field


Research Questions

- 1. What is the state of officer wellbeing among rural Nebraska police?
 - Wellbeing includes measures of both mental and physical states
- 2. What access do rural police officers have to mental health resources?
- 3. How satisfied are rural police officers with their job?

Methods

- An online survey was distributed to 21 rural police agencies in Nebraska
 - Four measurement categories
 - 1. Job Satisfaction and Workplace Culture
 - 2. Mental Health
 - 3. Physical Health
 - 4. Demographics









Conclusions

- Among respondents, a high percentage of officers encountered traumatic events
 - None sought professional help
 - Despite this, respondents reported few PTSD symptoms and low suicidal ideation
- Rural agencies offered mental health resources, but offerings varied
- Officers were fairly satisfied with what was offered
- Rural officers had high overall job satisfaction

Limitations & Future Work

- Limitations:
 - Current study limited to 21 police departments
 - Lack of diverse demographics
 - Low response rate
- Future Directions:
 - 144 total rural departments in Nebraska
 - Expand survey to urban departments to allow for comparisons across agencies of different sizes and locations
